Mission: Support and work with groups and land managers towards effective and productive natural resource stewardship within a human setting

Border Ranges Richmond Valley Landcare Network (BRRVLN) is a not-for-profit incorporated association whose members are groups (Landcare groups, Farming groups) interested in natural resource management issues. Individuals who do not have the opportunity to join a member group can join a sub-group known as Friends of BRRVLN.

Each member group has a seat on the committee and has one vote. The executive committee, being the office bearers, address the day to day affairs of the organisation.

BRRVLN is also seeking partners and associates who can provide technical and other resources.

BRRVLN hosts a Local Landcare Coordinator available to provide support for all member groups.

BRRVLN Objectives:

- a. To encourage land managers towards effective and productive natural resource stewardship within a human setting.
- b. To provide support towards ongoing health of the people, the land and its natural and agricultural resources.
- c. To assist with the identification of issues relating to land use, soil, water and vegetation resources
- d. To foster cooperation and collaboration between land managers (public and private)
- e. To act as a conduit between land managers and government
- f. To facilitate the implementation of best management practices which will support long-term, profitable primary production and ensure the integrity of soil, water and energy systems, as well as the conservation of native plant and animal communities;
- g. To assist Landcare groups, rural industry groups, individuals, land management agencies, research organisations and other community bodies to collaborate on issues of land management and associated social implications, including the promotion and resourcing of Landcare activity.
- h. To assist with the resourcing and management of projects that address these objectives
- i. As a local network be a member of North Coast Regional Landcare Network and Landcare NSW

2020-2021 BRRVLN Actions and Achievements

Providing entry level support to Community / Landcare

Over the 2020-21 financial year BRRVLN hosted the **Local Landcare Coordinator Initiative Project**.

This contract aims to **support community interests** in Landcare and **build capacity** of landholders, Landcare groups and farming groups to undertake Landcare activities. This role supports both landholders that have an existing relationship with Landcare and landholder that are new to the conversation.

The BRRVLN Landcare office holds an open door to the community on Tuesdays and Thursdays as supported by the Local Landcare Coordinator Initiative.

The BRRVLN office receives a diverse range of enquires a snapshot of which is presented below.

The BRRVLN Landcare office receives diverse enquiries, through phone, email and direct at the office. While some enquires are resolved at the initial point (e.g. identifying a weed species) many develop into greater longer-term engagement and connection within the Landcare community.

Through 20-21 BRRVLN provided tailored support to our **16 member groups** extending across the Kyogle and Richmond Valley LGA's.

Providing learning opportunities through field days and events

Due to the impacts of Covid 19, the calendar for BRRVLN workshops and events experienced many challenges. However, surprisingly, a number of events were able to navigate the covid obstacles. During the 2020-21 period BRRVLN conducted 21 workshops with a total of 414 participants.

Land for Wildlife

11 Land for Wildlife assessments were achieved in the 2020-21 financial year across the Kyogle LGA – Richmond Valley LGA's.

Employment

These above projects have offered significant opportunities to provide employment. Over the 2020-21 financial year BRRVLN facilitated direct employment of 26 people as BRRVLN staff with a collective total of 7853 hours. This was an increase from the previous financial year of 17 people and a collective of 4921 hours. BRRVLN is proud to be able to create employment opportunities for people in the natural resource management field.

Additional to this internal employment, BRRVLN engaged numerous contractors to deliver services within BRRVLN projects further supporting local employment.

Partnerships and relationships

Partnerships and relationships with other stakeholders and agencies have continued to improve with particular advancements with Kyogle Council, Richmond Valley Council, Local Land Services, NPWS, Macquarie University, Dept Planning Industry and Environment, Friends of the Koala, Biodiversity Conservation Trust, Gugin Guddaba Aboriginal Land Council, Landcare NSW and Landcare Australia, WWF.
